St Anne's Church Singleton

There has been a church on the site since 1358, when Henry Duke of Lancaster granted the custody of the Chapel of "St Mary" to John de Est Witton, a hermit. First dedicated to St. Anne in 1650, the church went through several builds and rebuilds.

The present building was dedicated in 1860, having been built at a cost of £4,000, mainly provided by the then Lord of the Manor, Alderman Thomas Miller of Preston.

The Miller family continued their association with the church and several plaques around the building carry their name.

The unusual and ornate decoration of the nave walls and roof was undertaken recently to recapture how the church might have looked in days gone by.

In 2003 Singleton church joined with the parish of St. Chad, Poulton and St. Hilda, Carleton. Our services are led by the clergy team, which includes the Vicar, Revd. Canon M Keighley, who lives at the Vicarage in Poulton.

Singleton Village

Singleton Village

Singleton is often referred to as 'the Model Village of the Fylde'. Mentioned in the Domesday Book, the settlement was remodelled as an estate village in the late nineteenth century by Preston cotton magnate Thomas Miller, of Horrocks-Miller.

Historical Landmarks:

- **Singleton Church:** Built in 1861 by E.G. Paley, this Grade II listed building is a notable landmark in the village.
- **Fire Engine House:** Another Grade II listed building, it features distinctive pargeted plaster panels and a louvered bellcote.

Cultural Heritage:

- Singleton is reputed to have been the residence of one of the more famous Lancashire Witches, Mag Shelton.

Community and Surroundings:

- The village is surrounded by picturesque farmland and has maintained its unique identity despite being within easy reach of the Fylde coast resorts.
- Singleton Village Hall serves as a hub for local events and activities

Local Amenities:

- The village is part of the Rural North Fylde ward and falls within the constituency of Fylde
- Nearby locations include Lodge Lane, Church Road, and Station Road, each contributing to the village's charm.
