Healthy Snacks Policy



Your children get 14 weeks holiday a year!

There are **38 weeks** in the year when schools are open, and **14 weeks (175 days)** when families can visit family overseas; go on holiday; travel; pupils can work, take educational trips, attend non urgent medical appointments.....**So is your request for leave exceptional?**







When a Child Arrives Late:

- It interrupts concentration.
- It wastes valuable learning time.
- The teacher repeats information / instructions whilst others have to wait.
- The late child is at an immediate disadvantage because they may have missed important teaching points, missed discussions where ideas are shared and will be generally unsettled.
- Children feel stressed and anxious about having to walk into their lessons late, some children find being late very distressing.

A Polite Reminder About Drop-Off and Collection Times:

- Parents are expected to drop off and collect their children (or arrange for this to happen) punctually. If parents are late, children will be placed in Acorns Club, and a charge will apply. Please ensure you collect your child promptly at 3:15 pm (or 4:15 pm if your child participates in an extracurricular activity).
- Late drop-off and collection are monitored by Miss Manns, our Family Learning Mentor.

Please Note: -

Lancashire County Council's policy states that:

- Penalty notices are issued for unauthorised absences of 5 days (10 sessions) or more.
- If a child accumulates 15 days or more of unauthorised leave, the case is reviewed individually and may lead
 to prosecution under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996, especially if previous fines have been issued or
 ignored.
- After two penalty notices within a 3-year period, further unauthorised absences will not result in another fine but may lead to court proceedings




Where do I start?

The online world offers amazing opportunities but also brings elements of potential risk and for Parents & Carers, making sense of the online world can appear to be an enormous challenge. Unlike previous generations, the online environment is an integral part of children's lives and therefore we can no longer consider their wellbeing or safety without also considering their relationship to technology. However, staying safe online is fundamentally about behaviours rather than the technology itself and if approached from this perspective, we can begin to gain confidence to support our children.

The illustration below provides some useful tips for Parents and Carers when discussing the online environment with children







Have you heard of SWIGGLE?

Swiggle.org.uk!

Swiggle child-friendly search engine from the Online Safety experts at SWGfL.

Searching the internet for images or content can sometimes be a bit hit and miss. It can be hard to find the right content and sometimes you can stumble onto things that might make you feel upset, embarrassed or sad. Swiggle can help you with your first steps on the road to better online searching.

Swiggle uses the very latest search technologies to make your searches more useful. It not only gives you safer access to online content but encourages responsible behaviour too.

With your new friend SwiggleBot to help you, you can search for great information and images, and if you do see things that you think are not right, you can let SWGfL know and they will consider blocking it. You can even use SwiggleBot to cover your screen while you go and get help from an adult.

Swiggle.org.uk is a great start in encouraging responsible online searching After all, the best way to keep yourself safe and happy online is by having a safe and happy attitude. A better internet starts with you.

How it works

Swiggle is powered by Google Custom Search, the results are filtered using Google SafeSearch, and They have configured the results to prioritise educational resources.

They also filter the search terms to check that Swiggle is not being used to search for inappropriate content.

Make Swiggle your default search engine!

You can search using Swiggle directly from your address bar by installing Swiggle as your default search engine:



Stay Safe on the Internet

The internet is a vast resource, and some content is not appropriate for children, They recommend you add Swiggle to your browser or put the Screen Cover link on your bookmark bar so that if you go to a page that is not appropriate, you can cover the screen and go and tell an adult.

Reporting Tools

Swiggle provides you with reporting tools to get inappropriate content blocked. You can report pages found through this search using the reporting page.

And if you use our <u>Screen Cover</u>, we also provide a tool to send a report about any page to your system administrator, so they can block it with their filter.

Applying to Secondary Schools

- **31 October 2025 -** National closing date for secondary applications (statutory).
 - During this period all applications are processed and all preferences are considered against
 the published admissions policy. Where there are more applications than places available,
 decisions are made as to which children should be offered the available places. We will liaise
 and exchange information with all other admission authorities including neighbouring local
 authorities. The allocation and offer of a secondary school place are finalised.

2 March 2026 - Offers issued to parents

(The national offer date is 1 March, if this date falls on a weekend or a bank holiday, offers are sent the next working day.)

If you are not happy with an initial offer the appeals period starts from your receipt of the offer. <u>Appeal information</u> will be issued later as this allows some time for reserve lists to operate.

Appeals that we receive after the deadline will be slotted into the schedule where possible. We cannot guarantee this, however, and late appeals may have to be heard after the agreed date at a second round of hearings.  and exchange information with all other admission authorities including neighbouring local
